In Exodus, chapter 18, the Bible says that Moses was serving as a judge for the people and they were standing around him day and night. Jethro comes to visit Moses and sees what is going on. This is his reaction:

When his father-in-law saw all that Moses was doing for the people, he said, 'What is this you are doing for the people? Why do you alone sit as judge, while all these people stand round you from morning till evening? Moses answered

Two Council positions open at Holy Trinity



CONGREGATIONAL MEETING | MAY 16


Please mark your calendars for May 16 at 1:00 PM so you can attend a congregational meeting. Your attendance at the meeting is important to help us make decisions to move ahead as we continue to look at how we can do church in these unusual times.

During this meeting we will be making an important decision about reallocating money from the Vacant Lot Fund into other funds where it can be put to use. This includes creating a Pastoral Staffing Fund that will be used to help supplement any budget shortfall that may occur in the first few years after we have called a new pastor. If this fund gets approved we know we can move ahead in confidence with the call process for an associate pastor.

In addition to this vote, we will also be voting on new council members and hearing about ministry from the last year.

Because of the pandemic, there will not be an in-person meeting. Our meeting will be held on the Zoom platform. We will still need our quorum of approximately 50 people, however, so we hope you will mark your calendars and look for the zoom link in your all-church email as the date gets closer.

Council Action items—April 2021

Church Council met via Zoom on April 20, to approve and discuss so many new and exciting things that are happening at HTLC. Here are some highlights:

- Council reviewed the Mission Site Profile that will be sent to Synod to officially start the call process. With a few changes, it was approved! Thanks especially to Shawn Howie and Steve Hanke who put it together. Because of the over 100 members who participated in answering the Focus Group questions, we had a clear vision of what HTLC would like to do and what to continue. Thanks to all who participated and honestly shared their comments!
- Council also approved members for the Call Committee submitted by the Task Force. They are: Ryan Ekenstam, Marty Kreman, Karin Ninnemann, Joan Eggert, Steve Hanke, Kari Slattum, Nina Wong, Janet Witt. Thanks to all of the members who said yes and to Shawn Howie for recruiting such good candidates!
- The May Congregational Meeting is on May 16, via Zoom at 1:00 PM. The
 council recommended designation of our reserves and gift policy revision to
 be approved by the congregation along with approving new council members
 and Synod Council delegates for the Synod meeting on June 4-5, and finally
 bless and affirm the Call Committee.
- Council approved hiring a new landscape company, Vemgogreen. They will start in June and we should see a fresh change on our campus.
- Council discussed the worship schedule for May and June. If we continue
 to stay in the orange tier, we will have weekly outdoor services in May and
 start to have some form of indoor services in June. Plans for an outdoor
 communion service on May 23, were approved
- Miriam Nakayama and James Yu, as well as the Authentic Diversity
 Committee, are working on a letter of support to be sent to Asian/Pacific
 Islander churches in Thousand Oaks and elsewhere.
- Holy Trinity will support the African Descent Lutheran Association (ADLA),
 the local branch of the ELCA organization that engages, involves and invests
 in the gifts, interests, and capacity of people of African descent in every
 aspect of the life of this ELCA church. Dues are \$100 a year. By supporting
 them, this would be a great step in becoming an anti-racist congregation
 because it would help deepen our relationship with the African descent
 congregations in our synod.
- Honey Tree had a very successful registration for next year. They have plans to start their monthly contributions to HTLC as early as July.

Boulder, Colorado letter

After the shooting that took place on March 22, in Boulder Colorado, I said I would send a letter to a Lutheran pastor I knew there and invited others to write notes as well. Thank you to everyone who wrote a note. A copy of the letter I wrote on behalf of Holy Trinity is below. — Pastor Erik

April 20, 2021

Dear People of Atonement Lutheran,

After we learned about the tragic shooting in Boulder, our congregation wanted to do something to reach out to your community. I suggested that we could send a note of encouragement to one of the Lutheran churches in Boulder as a sign of our concern. My wife and I know Pastor Chad from various Lutheran events over the years which is why I am writing to you. Along with my letter on behalf of our congregation there were some folks who wanted to write personal notes as well. Those are included in this envelope.

We here at Holy Trinity know something about what it is like to have such a horrible event occur in your city. In 2018 we had the mass shooting at the Borderline Bar and Grill. The random nature of such events along with the multiple casualties can shake a community to its core. Many people knew someone or had some kind of connection to a person at the shooting. There were prayer vigils and memorial services. One of the young men sang in the choir at California Lutheran University right next to our church and had attend services with us on occasion. The effects of that tragedy still reverberate throughout our city.

Whether you knew someone who was in the grocery store on that day or not, you may have gone to it yourself or you may have driven by it many times. You may view that place and your community in a different way now as your sense of safety and security may have been shaken. Questions of "why?" may have come to your mind and you may have asked God the same question.

However you are feeling, we want you to know that it is not strange to be feeling such things when your city has experienced a traumatic event, and it can take a while to heal. We also want you to know that you are not alone. We have prayed for you during our services and our spirits have gone out to you and your families.

As people of faith, we stand with you against the ways of violence that would disrupt our lives and we stand with you as we seek to bring healing where it is possible to do so. We trust that God is with us and with you as we seek to follow the way of Christ and we ask that God's strong presence would uphold and surround you especially in these days.

Thinking about new tea flavors with Miriam

We are such good customers at Holy Trinity, a special representative of Equal Exchange called me to thank us for our business. I also got some news about their six new flavors of tea. I will be adding them to our Fair Trade inventory. I have tried the spearmint and it is my new favorite.

From Equal Exchange:

Most teas—even those that are certified as fair trade—come from

large plantations where workers have little say and are trapped in a system of dependency. Most of these plantations were established under colonial rule and remain largely unchanged today. US consumers know very little about what tea is or where it comes from, not to mention the problems that remain for farm workers, mostly women, on plantations even today.

For more than two decades, Equal Exchange has been working to build an alternative model in tea. One that centers around democratically organized groups of small farmers, many of whom own just a few hectares of land themselves, but together, are able to engage in international trade with the help of like-minded organizations who support them in processing and export.

Each box of tea is \$3.25. Here are the flavors:

Hibiscus

Rich in color and flavor, this pure hibiscus tea offers a wonderful zingy flavor that is the perfect mix of tart and sweet. Naturally caffeine-free, it's an herbal tea which is delicious hot or iced.

Lemongrass Ginger

This refreshing blend combines the citrus overtones of lemongrass with the peppery finish of ginger. A naturally caffeine-free herbal tonic to revitalize and recharge.

Assam Black Tea

A traditional Camellia sinensis Assam black tea that celebrates the unique flavor characteristics of the Assam tea-growing region. Mellow and malty.

Live book study in May

Zealot: The Life and Times of Jesus of Nazareth is a controversial biography of the historical and religious figure of Jesus, written by Muslim scholar Reza Aslan. Aslan conducted thorough research not only into the life of Jesus, but also into the political and social situation in the Middle East during his rise to power and fame, in order to determine the factors that lead to his overwhelming popularity for centuries to come.

The novelty of Aslan's book isn't the claim that Jesus was a peasant or a religious zealot of his time. Most early Christian scholars commonly agree upon this. His new work comes from his thorough research into the social, political, and economic situation that led to the rise of Jesus in first-century Palestine, and the circumstances leading to his trial as an enemy of the state and subsequent death

This will be conducted as a live book study on Zoom for six Thursday mornings at 11:00 AM.

We have already started the study, but you can join us in May for most of the chapters. You may purchase the book Zealot, by Reza Aslan on your own or let the church office know and we can purchase a book for you. Here are the times we will meet. Each session begins at 11:00 AM on Zoom.

In Memoriam Gordon Stone

October 6, 1924-April 17, 2021

For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God. Ephesians 2:8

One of our members, Gordon Stone, died at the end of April at age 97. Gordon and his wife, Shirlee, had been married for 75 years. They moved to University Village about nine years ago and joined Holy Trinity shortly thereafter, in September 2012. They faithfully attended the 11 AM worship service as well as helped to host many faith-based events at University Village organized by Holy Trinity members who live there. Gordon was also a communion minister.

Gordon was a lifelong Lutheran who knew well the Lutheran emphasis on grace being a gift from God. He and Shirlee often attended Bible study and many times during discussion Gordon would ask, "Where is the grace in this story? I believe God is a God of grace." Then he would add, "I think God would want everyone to be in heaven."

Gordon certainly trusted that he was going to heaven and this gave him a peace, especially during the last weeks of his life where he expressed a readiness to meet his Creator. We are glad Gordon is at peace, but we will miss him at Holy Trinity. Please keep Shirlee and his family in your prayers.

him, 'Because the people come to me to seek God's will. ¹⁶ Whenever they have a dispute, it is brought to me and I decide between the parties and inform them of God's decrees and instructions.' Moses' father-in-law replied, 'What you are doing is not good. You and these people who come to you will only wear yourselves out. The work is too heavy for you; you cannot handle it alone.

Jethro goes on to advise Moses to select trustworthy people to work with him to divide up the tasks so that he does not burn out. Moses takes his advice and recruits some helpers so that he can be sustained in the work God has called him to do. It is a reminder that as we do the ministry God calls us to, we need to work with others in order that the work can be sustained over the long haul.

This is why I am excited that Holy Trinity is in the process of looking into calling a second pastor. If you have not heard yet, a Staffing Task Force has been doing a series of focus groups the last couple of months in order to listen to people share about their hopes and dreams for Holy Trinity.

Adding a staff person has been a big concern that has been raised, and there is a particular desire to add a pastor whose focus would be in the area of youth and family ministry along with small groups for learning and building community. We have been in contact with the synod and a call committee has begun to form.

At the congregational meeting on May 16, the congregation

see as well as those published in last month's April issue of Tempo Newsletter. If anyone has photos, please email them to me, sherigroenveld@yahoo.com.



I also hope that those who can get the COVID-19 vaccine will choose to do so. I just received my second Moderna vaccine. My arm is a bit sore but all is good.


I want us all to bloom with full spring colors and share the spirit with those around us and bare fruit to feed our souls.

SUNDAYS ON THE PATIO 9:30 AM | Informal Worship 11:00 AM | Traditional Worship As things get better in our county regarding the pandemic we will be moving into a new phase of our worship life during the month of May. This means we are going to be providing an in-person worship opportunity every Sunday. It will still be outside on the patio with 9:30 AM time being the informal service with the band and 11:00 AM time being the traditional service with hymns and piano. For now, we will also be continuing to do the pre-recorded worship services that people will be able to access on YouTube from home.

On May 23, we are planning to do a live communion for the first time since the pandemic started. We will have individual cups and wafers for each separate person to be picked up at the beginning of the service and will only briefly take off our masks

at the end of service to receive communion. Since we will be outside and our COVID numbers have gone down, the Church Council felt it was safe enough to add back in this element of worship for a Sunday and see how it goes.

Looking ahead, we are hoping that in June we might be back inside the church sanctuary. If more people continue to get vaccinated and we stay in the "orange tier," which means COVID cases are lower, this will be our plan. Please know, however, that even when we go back in the sanctuary we will still be following our COVID protocols with check-ins, wearing masks, and using chairs instead of pews to keep appropriate distance.
